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ABSTRACT

This resource guide provides information on programs, publications, organizations, and other resources related to prevention of fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS). The purpose of this guide is to assist health care providers to comply with Indian Health Service (IHS) FAS goals and objectives. It gives examples of community approaches to FAS prevention, depicts a map of 145 facilities nationwide, and reproduces a copy of an FDA Drug Bulletin with the Surgeon General's Advisory on Alcohol and Pregnancy. Maternal and child health area-consultants are listed for IHS headquarters and the 12 IHS service areas. Descriptions are provided for 31 organized FAS prevention programs, and 49 alcoholism treatment programs accepting pregnant women are listed. Contact information is also given for IHS Alcohol and Substance Abuse Program coordinators, IHS-area mental health branch chiefs, IHS-area social services chiefs, and other consultants. The guide provides price and availability information for FAS-related books, newsletters, slides, curriculums, videos, brochures, catalogs, posters, and display models, as well as materials from the National Clearinghouse FAS resources. Many entries are annotated. Also included are two poems, "I Am My Mother's Child" and "I Have Chosen Sobriety," by Tom Yowell. (TSP)





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ORGANIZED FAS PREVENTION PROGRAMS

The Indian Health Service Headquarters West (IHS-HQW) Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) Project received funding from the Indian Health Service Maternal and Child Health section to begin operation (1991) to provide training and technical assistance to IHS, tribal and community health care workers in the prevention, recognition and management of FAS. In accordance with Public Law 100-713 section 714, the FAS project is willing to work with all IHS tribal and community health care workers in efforts to reduce the rate of FAS/FAE among Indian people. The FAS Project serves as a national clearinghouse so that information and resources can be exchanged and disseminated more effectively. The FAS project staff consist of FAS Coordinator, FAS Assistant, and a Secretary.

The Indian Children's Program (ICP) (Albuquerque Area) has been re-established as a regional consortium of University Affiliated Programs from the University of New Mexico, Northern Arizona University and Utah State university and funded jointly by Indian Health Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. This program provides diagnostic and treatment consultation to children, ages birth to 21, with suspected disabilities from the Navajo and Hopi reservations and the multiple Pueblo tribes in Arizona, New Mexico and Southern Colorado. The program serves the BIA/IHS Albuquerque and Navajo Areas plus the Hopi Reservation. Referrals may be received from BIA, IHS, mental health centers, schools, Head Start programs, and other pre-school programs. Parents are encouraged to contact the teachers or directors in these agencies to refer their children for services. The program is meant to supplement existing local resources rather than to compete with them. The ICP staff is available in a consulting capacity to work with local service providers and families to meet the identified needs of the clients. Surgeon General's Advisory on Alcohol and Pregnancy

The Surgeon General advises women who are pregnant (or considering pregnancy) not to drink alcoholic beverages and to be aware of the alcoholic content of foods and drugs.

A recent report to the President and Congress¹ summarizes current scientific knowledge about health hazards associated with alcohol consumption, including those during pregnancy. The report concludes that alcohol consumption during pregnancy, especially in the early months, can harm the fetus.

Among the findings of the report are the following:

- o Significantly decreased birth weight has been observed among the children of some women who average only one ounce of absolute alcohol (two standard drinks) per day during pregnancy.²
- o Sizeable and significant increases in spontaneous abortions have been observed at reported alcohol consumption levels as low as one ounce of absolute alcohol twice a week.^{3,4}
- o A woman who consumes alcohol at amounts consistent with a diagnosis of alcoholism risks bearing a child with a specific cluster of severe physical and mental defects known as the fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) (See September-October 1977 *Drug Bulletin*). This syndrome of birth defects is frequently associated with mental retardation, and it is also characterized by central nervous system disorders, growth deficiencies, a specific cluster of facial abnormalities, and other

malformations, particularly skeletal, urogenital, and cardiac. Many of these characteristics are individually subtle but are readily apparent to trained dysmorphologists.

- o Even if she does not bear a child with full FAS, a woman who drinks heavily is more likely to bear a child with one or more of the birth defects included in the syndrome. Microcephaly, which is associated with mental impairment, is one of the more common of these defects.

The reported effects on pregnancy outcome appear to be independent of potentially confounding variables including nutrition and smoking.

In addition, it has been demonstrated that alcohol readily enters breast milk and thus is transmitted to the nursing infant. Heavy alcohol consumption is known to decrease the mother's milk.

Research to establish the mechanisms by which alcohol consumption affects fetal and neonatal growth and development is underway.

Health professionals are urged to inquire routinely about alcohol consumption by patients who are pregnant or considering pregnancy. This information should be included in their medical records.

Each patient should be told about the risk of alcohol consumption during pregnancy and advised to not drink alcoholic beverages and to be aware of the alcoholic content of foods and drugs.

Interested practitioners can obtain material about techniques for obtaining accurate drinking information from patients, as well as written material for pregnant patients, by contacting the National Clearinghouse for Alcohol and Drug Information (NCADI),^{5,6}

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
